**Findings of Poll on Watain Concert**

1 April 2019 - 2 in 3 who were aware, agreed with Government's decision to disallow the concert. But in general, the majority of those polled also agreed with the content regulation approach of disallowing offensive content in performances that may impact religious sensitivities rather than stopping the performances altogether.

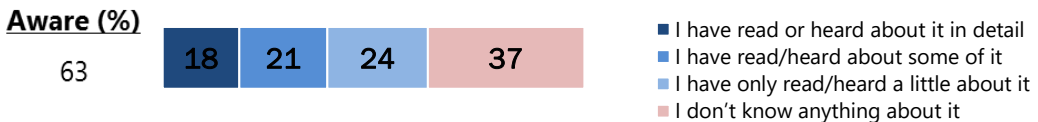
To better gauge public awareness and understand sentiments on the Government's decision to disallow the concert of the Swedish metal band, Watain, in the interest of public order, religious and social harmony, REACH conducted a Computer-Assisted Telephone Interview (CATI) poll from **11 to 15 March 2019**.

2 About 680 respondents were polled. Respondents were randomly selected Singapore citizens aged 15 and above. The estimated margin of error is 3.8% at a 95% confidence interval. The sample was weighted by gender and age to ensure representativeness of the national population.

**Awareness and Sentiments**

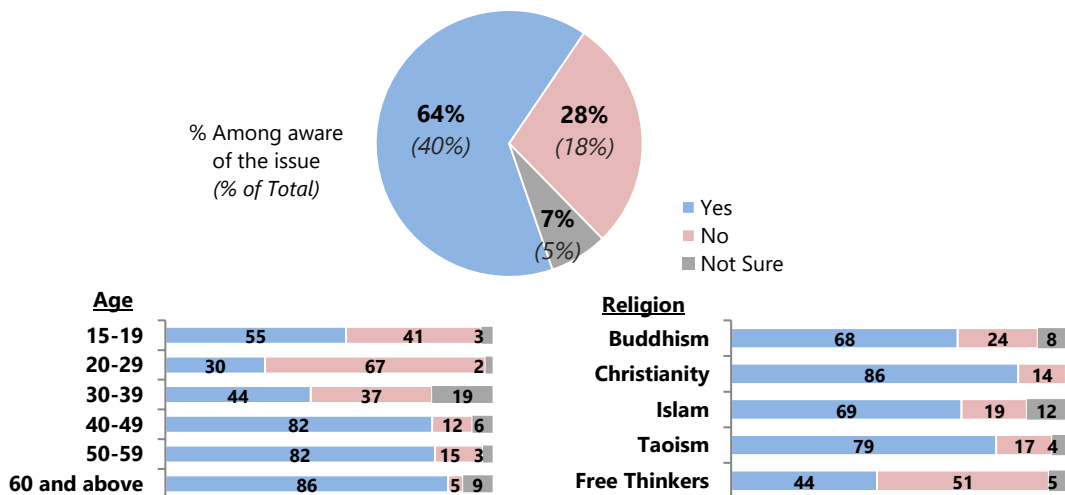
3 Overall, about 60% of the population were aware of the Government's decision to disallow the band's concert.

4 Of those who were aware, about 2 in 3 supported the Government's decision to disallow the concert. Younger respondents (in their 20s) and those who indicated that they were freethinkers, were more likely to disagree with the decision to disallow the concert.

**I support the Government's decision to disallow the concert.**



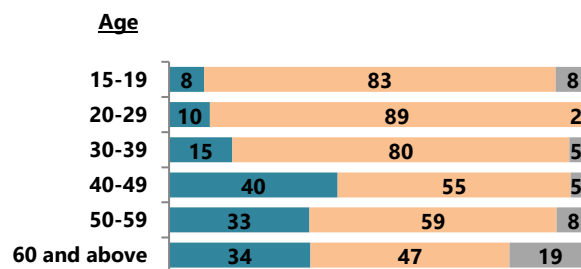


5 About 1 in 4 respondents felt that performances that may impact religious sensitivities in Singapore should be banned, while 2 in 3 felt that they may be allowed, but with specific rules to disallow offensive content. Similarly, younger respondents were more likely to feel that performances that may impact religious sensitivities should be allowed with specific rules attached.
